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Résumé of Paul Ré

Biography

Paul Ré is best known for his books, *Art, Peace, and Transcendence: Réograms That Elevate and Unite* and *The Dance of the Pencil: Serene Art by Paul Ré;* his widely shown traveling exhibit *Touchable Art for the Blind and Sighted*; and for the <u>Paul Bartlett Ré Peace Prize</u> which is administered by the University of New Mexico Foundation. The Ré Peace Prize has been endowed to function in perpetuity, and it extends Paul's half-century of work promoting harmony in the world through art and other peace-furthering endeavors. It encourages persons in all disciplines in the advancement of both *internal and external peace*. As of 2020, thirty-two individuals and organizations have been honored. Beyond the joy of creating works of art, Paul's greatest reward is when people are moved by his work toward achieving peace and fulfillment.

Paul Ré was born in Albuquerque, New Mexico, where he still resides. He earned a bachelor's degree in physics, with honors, from the California Institute of Technology in 1972; this has served him well as an artist expressing the beauty of science. Paul has been acclaimed by art critics as "a virtuoso of the pencil" (Alfred Frankenstein, *San Francisco Chronicle*) for his art of "quiet greatness and noble simplicity" (Allan Pearson, *Albuquerque Journal*). In thirteen states, he has had twenty-two solo exhibits, including exhibits at the UNM Jonson Gallery, Albuquerque Museum, Triangle Gallery, Wichita Museum, Sumter Gallery, J. B. Speed Museum, Colorado Springs Museum, and Karpeles Museum. His traveling exhibition of *Touchable Art for the Blind and Sighted* has been shown eighteen times in North America. A documentary film on his *Touchable Art* was produced by SCETV in 1990, and a companion book was created. Paul is now making a second tactile exhibit, *Inspired by Nature*, which is dedicated to environmental conservation.

Ré's volume, Art, Peace, and Transcendence: Réograms That Elevate and Unite

was published in 2015 by UNM Press. It received the 2016 New Mexico – Arizona Book Award for Philosophy and the 2019 Independent Press Award for Distinguished Favorite in Fine Arts. His monograph, *The Dance of the Pencil: Serene Art by Paul Ré*, was published in 1993; the *Journal of the Print World* reviewed it as "one of the outstanding art books of the year." His writing has appeared in *Leonardo* XIII–2, XIV–2, and XV–2; the *Journal of Visual Impairment & Blindness; New America; Spirit* (seven covers and poems); *La Mamelle*; and *Design Journal*. Significant articles about his work have been featured in *Contemporary Graphic Artists* III, *Spirit of Enterprise: The 1990 Rolex Awards*, and other reference volumes.

Paul's art has been highly regarded by artists Georgia O'Keeffe, Raymond Jonson, and Ed Garman; Nobel laureates Subrahmanyan Chandrasekhar, Richard Feynman, Kip Thorne, and Roger Sperry; and many other individuals. Also an accomplished guitarist, poet, and humorist, he is editing his collected poems, *The Iris Ballet*, and has compiled his fifty-four volumes of aphorisms and micro-essays into the upcoming volume *The Récycled Dictionary*. Paul Bartlett Ré (pronounced Ray)

- 1950 Born in Albuquerque, New Mexico, son of Ernest Ré, an Italian American woodworker, and Helen Bartlett Ré, an English American homemaker
- 1967 Receives award for first place in physics at the International Science Fair in San Francisco, California, for "Coanda Effect Propulsion" (involving vortex formation, surface adhesion, and the entrainment of surrounding gas); NASA Award alternate
- 1968 Receives award for first place in physics and the NASA Award at the International Science Fair in Detroit, Michigan, for "High Speed Interacting Jets" (jets as in supersonic streams of air); also receives awards from IEEE (Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers), WESCON-FES (Western Electronics Show and Convention Future Engineers Show), and other institutions; graduates as valedictorian of Sandia High School in Albuquerque

- 1972 Receives BSc in physics (with honors; fifth in class) from the California Institute of Technology in Pasadena, California; begins working full-time as an artist expressing the beauty of physics in art
- 1979 Begins translating his drawings and paintings into tactual works for the blind and sighted
- 1981 First traveling exhibit, Touchable Art for the Blind and Sighted, begins circulating
- 1981–1985 Develops and teaches a course in laboratory physics for nonscience majors at the University of New Mexico in Albuquerque
- 1982 and 1984 Receives residency grants from the Wurlitzer Foundation in Taos, New Mexico
- 1983 Completes handmade edition of Touchable Art. A Book for the Blind and Sighted
- 1987–1994 Serves on the artist advisory board of the Access to Art program at the American Folk Art Museum in New York, New York
- 1990 Becomes a life member of the Nature Conservancy through fifteen years of bicycling for conservation
- 1992 The Dance of the Pencil: Serene Art by Paul Ré is published
- 1994 Begins developing second traveling exhibit, *Inspired by Nature*: *Touchable Art for the Blind and Sighted*
- 1994–present Serves as director of the Paul Ré Collection and Archives
- 2000 Begins creating hybrid hand-digital artworks, or Réograms
- 2002 Becomes member of the Torch Bearers of Caltech
- 2007 The Paul Bartlett Ré Peace Prize established at the University of New Mexico
- 2009 Becomes member of the Tom L. Popejoy Society of the University of New Mexico
- 2012 Becomes member of the New Horizons Society of the University of New Mexico
- 2015 Art, Peace, and Transcendence is published by UNM Press
- 2016 Art, Peace, and Transcendence receives the New Mexico Arizona Book Award for Philosophy; was also a finalist in Fine Arts, Science, and Large Format Cover Design

Showings of Touchable Art for the Blind and Sighted

- There have been eighteen showings of Paul Ré's first traveling exhibition, *Touchable Art for the Blind and Sighted*. The exhibit requires about one hundred feet of wall space. Over one hundred thousand blind and sighted persons have experienced it, and exhibitions have lasted from one to six months. The exhibit has received considerable newspaper, TV, and radio coverage; only a few selected examples could be noted here.
